This Washington Post-University of Maryland poll was conducted by telephone September 19-23, 2024, among a random sample of 1,012 registered voters in the state of Maryland. The sample was drawn from a database of Maryland registered voters; with 62 percent reached by live callers on cellphones, 16 percent live callers on landlines and 22 percent completing the survey online via cellphone from a text invitation. Results among both registered voters and likely voters have a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points, including design effects due to weighting. Sampling, data collection and tabulation was conducted by Braun Research of Princeton, N.J.

This poll was jointly sponsored and funded by The Washington Post and The University of Maryland's Center for Democracy and Civic Engagement within the College of Behavioral and Social Science's Department of Government and Politics. The poll includes interviews in English.

This questionnaire was administered with the exact questions in the exact order as appears in this document. Demographics are not shown. If a question was asked of a reduced base of the sample, a parenthetical preceding the question identifies the group asked. Questions that contain parenthetical phrases indicate clauses that were randomly rotated for respondents. References to results with "RV" samples indicate results among registered voters.

A total of 1,012 interviews were completed through a stratified random sample from a database of Maryland registered voters maintained by Aristotle, Inc., in which voters have been matched to landline and cellular phone numbers. Only voters who confirmed their name as the sampled registered voter were interviewed.

This survey uses statistical weighting procedures to account for deviations in the survey sample from known population characteristics, which helps correct for differential survey participation and random variation in samples.

The sample was weighted to match population estimates for the demographic makeup of Maryland registered voters, as detailed in the table below.

All error margins have been adjusted to account for the survey's design effect, which is 1.3 for this survey. The design effect is a factor representing the survey's deviation from a simple random sample and takes into account decreases in precision

due to sample design and weighting procedures. Surveys that do not incorporate a design effect overstate their precision.
