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Background and Methodology

Patrick E. Gonzales graduated magna cum laude from the University of Baltimore with a degree in political science.

His career in the field of public opinion research began in the mid-1980s as an analyst with *Mason-Dixon Opinion Research*. During this time, Mr. Gonzales helped develop, craft and implement election surveys and exit polls for television and radio in the Baltimore-Washington D.C. metro area.

Mr. Gonzales has polled and analyzed thousands of elections in Maryland and across the country over the past forty years. Further, he and his associates have conducted numerous market research projects, crafting message development plans and generating strategy blueprints for businesses and organizations throughout the state.

Over his decades of conducting public opinion polls, Patrick Gonzales has been widely recognized by his peers for his ability to conduct unbiased surveys, and analyze the results in an impartial, evenhanded manner.

Mr. Gonzales appears frequently on radio and television in the Baltimore-D.C. region as a guest commentator.

This poll was conducted by ***Gonzales Research & Media Services, Inc.*** from December 21st through January 6th, 2026. A total of 808 registered voters in Maryland, who indicated they are likely to vote in the 2026 general election, were queried by live telephone interviews, utilizing both landline and cell phone numbers. A cross-section of interviews was conducted throughout the state, reflecting general election voting patterns.

The margin of error (MOE), per accepted statistical standards, is a range of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. If the entire population was surveyed, there is a 95% probability that the true numbers would fall within this range.

Synopsis

Maryland's resistance to Donald Trump is one of the state's defining reflexes, a kind of built-in recoil shaped by our deep-blue electorate, proximity to D.C., and a landscape where partisan patterns rarely budge. In his three elections here, Trump never received more than 35% of the vote, running aground each time on the same terrain: the dominance of the Baltimore–Washington suburbs, a weak showing with Black voters, and an independent voter bloc that, while persuadable in state races, leans solidly blue in national ones.

Maryland's political mood forms a consistent story across job approval, economic perceptions, and personal financial strain. The president's overall approval rating—36 percent approve, 63 percent disapprove—sets the tone: a state where views are not gently divided but sharply sorted. The intensity of feeling is unmistakable, with *strong* disapproval alone far, far outpacing total approval. What emerges is not a tentative or conflicted electorate but one offering a clear, emphatic judgment.

Two-thirds of Marylanders say their household expenses have worsened over the past year, and only 9 percent say things have improved. That sense of strain crosses demographic and partisan lines, even if the intensity varies. The shared sentiment is unambiguous: for many in the state, daily life feels more expensive, more pressured, and more uncertain.

Voter assessment of the president's handling of the economy follows a familiar arc. A stark 60 percent say his economic handling is “poor,” with only 32% calling it “excellent” or “good.”

As is often said, perception is reality - a point that dovetails neatly with Lincoln's observation: “Public sentiment is everything.”

President Donald Trump Job Approval

Among Maryland voters, 36 percent approve of the job Donald Trump is doing as president (26% “*strongly*” approve and 10% “*somewhat*” approve), while a pronounced 63% disapprove (58% “*strongly*” disapprove and 5% “*somewhat*” disapprove), with only 1 percent offering no opinion.

The numbers reveal a dynamic that feels baked into Maryland’s political DNA: a presidency that commands fierce devotion from a minority and equally fierce rejection from a majority. With just over a third of Marylanders offering approval and nearly two-thirds registering disapproval, the presidential portrait in the Old Line State sits on the wall inviting more judgment than discussion.

Party allegiance doesn’t merely shape these views, it defines their borders. Among Democrats, approval is a rounding error; among Republicans, disapproval is, illustrating that in polarized times, opinion hardens into identity long before it becomes data. Each side anchors its convictions like a cargo ship in the Bay waiting to get to the Port, leaving independents as the only group here where persuasion still seems possible. Among independents, 42% approve of the job Trump is doing, and 56% disapprove.

Cost of Living

A clear majority of Marylanders say the cost of living has worsened over the past year, with 67 percent reporting that their household expenses are higher than they were twelve months ago. Only 9 percent say things have improved, while nearly a quarter (24%) describe conditions as unchanged. The overall picture is one of broad financial strain, not a mixed or ambiguous set of signals.

Party lines shapes the intensity of the strain but not the direction. Democrats are the most likely to say costs have worsened, with three-quarters (76%) reporting deterioration and almost no one saying things are better. Republicans are less bleak but still tip negative, splitting 50 percent worse to 24 percent better. Independents fall in between, though nearly two-thirds also report worsening conditions. Across party lines, the sense of rising costs is unmistakable. There's a collective feeling in Maryland that we are running faster only to stay in place.

President Trump's Handling of the Economy

Marylanders deliver a blunt assessment of Trump's handling of the economy: six in ten rate his performance as *poor*, while only about a third (32%) place him in the excellent-or-good column. The middle ground is almost nonexistent, with just 7 percent calling his performance "fair." This isn't a muddled verdict but a decisively lopsided one.

Democratic respondents are nearly unanimous in their negative ratings, while Republicans overwhelmingly give Trump a thumbs up. Independent voters lean assertively negative as well, with nearly half (47%) rating his performance as poor and only about a third (37%) calling it excellent or good. The partisan divide is wide, but the overall trend is unmistakable.

Demographic patterns reinforce the statewide picture. Women (70%) and African-American voters (82%) register the strongest "poor" grade. Men come in noticeably more positive, but even among them, 48% rate President Trump's handling of the economy as *poor*.
