(Questions are asked by Tracy Call and answers given 1 2 by Jesse Osborne, as follows:) 3 FEMALE OFFICER: Hey, Jesse. 4 Hey. 5 А FEMALE OFFICER: My name is Aletha Thompson. 6 Nice to meet you. 7 Α FEMALE OFFICER: I'm with the FBI in Greenville. 8 You heard of the FBI? 9 Yeah. 10 A And I'm Tracy Call. One of the sheriff's 0 11 investigators here with Anderson County. 12 Nice to meet you. 13 А Nice to meet you. Before we start, you've probably Q 14 seen on TV before, seen somebody that had their rights 15 read to them and all? 16 Yeah. 17 A We have got to go through that formality, because 18 Q some things did occur tonight, like to talk to you about 19 them; but until we do that, I have to go through this. 20 All right? 21 22 All right. Α 23 FEMALE OFFICER: We understand you had a very, very rough day, long day. And you're very tired. 24 25 What's your full name? Q

23	any	/ questions, I want you to stop me and ask me. Okay?
24	41	All right.
25	Q	Says: "You have the right to remain silent.

3 Anything you say may be used against you in court. You 1 have the right to speak to a lawyer for advice before 2 you're asked any questions and have him with you during 3 questioning. If you cannot afford a lawyer, one will be 4 appointed for you before any questioning if you wish. If 5 6 you decide to answer questions now without a lawyer 7 present, you still have the right to stop answering 8 questions at any time. And you also have the right to 9 stop answering at any time until you speak with a lawyer." 10 Can I get you to read two of these back to me? 11 These the rights? А 12 Q Yeah, the stop -- right here. These two that I've 13 got the marks next to. Can you read them? 14 "You have the right to remain silent. Anything you A 15 say may be used against you in court." 16 Okay. Can you just put your initials next to that. Q All that does is show me that you can read and write. 17 1.8 Sign this side of it? Α Yeah. Just put your initials on the side there. 19 Q 20 (Complies.) 21 The next piece that I'm going to read to you is Q what's called the waiver. And that's what allows us to 22 23 talk. Okay? 24 (Nods head up and down.) А 25 It says -- and I apologize, I keep taking my glasses Q

off. To read I have to take glasses off, to see I have to put them on.

It says, "I have read this statement of the rights. I understand what my rights are. I am willing to make a statement and answer questions. I don't want a lawyer at this time. I understand and know what I'm doing. No promises or threats have been made to me. No pressure or coercion of any kind has been used against me."

Do you know what coercion is? It's a fancy word for use force. We don't use it in everyday language like people used to at the time. Basically what it means is I'm not forcing you to talk to me. I'm not promising anything under the sun. I'm not taking you out to get you a steak dinner and beer just to get you to talk. If you want to talk, we'll listen. If not, hey, it is what it is. Okay?

FEMALE OFFICER: It's your right.

A I want to get it out of the way.

Q Okay. Do you understand what I told you, what
coercion means? The definition of it? I'm not forcing
you. It's a free and voluntarily. If you understand what
coercion means, get you to put your initials right next to
that again.

A The little light mark?

Q Yes, sir. And then we'll get you to sign right here,

and right here, that we went through both sections of 1 that. 2 I can't really write in cursive. 3 А However, you can do it, it's fine with us. Q 4 FEMALE OFFICER: Why don't they teach cursive 5 anymore? 6 MALE OFFICER: Actually they started back this year. 7 Really? FEMALE OFFICER: 8 MALE OFFICER: Yeah. I have a daughter who's fixing 9 to graduate high school who was never taught cursive. 10 And I have an eight-year-old son having to learn it in third grade. FEMALE OFFICER: How else do you sign your signature? MALE OFFICER: That common core and all that 16 completely stopped it. When she get's a chance, I'm going to get her to witness that we went through this 17 18 together. Okay? 19 (Complies.) All right. Jesse, we're here to listen. Can I get 20 21 you anything before we start? You need a drink, something to eat, anything like that? 22 23 I had something before. А No. Okay. So, obviously we're at the sheriff's office, 24 Q some stuff has occurred today. What can you tell me about 25

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what's been going on?

For my whole life basically?

MALE OFFICER: Well, let's start with what happened Α today then we'll go backwards. How about that?

FEMALE OFFICER: We both understand you have been --

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you have had a really hard day. We understand this is hard for you. And there are a lot of things going on. So why don't we start from this morning and just talk our way through the events of today.

Well, nothing really happened this morning. It was A really last night that just, that happened.

FEMALE OFFICER: Okay. Well, let's start last night. You can just talk and --

MALE OFFICER: We're just going to listen.

Well, last night, my dad was fussing to me and my mom A about not getting paid enough for his chicken houses. And he was getting up in my face and stuff. And whenever he's drunk, he always like says he wants to fight me because I make this face to him. And he'll -- and then my mom will have to step in and get fussed at too. And last night he was just worse than he's ever been. He was just drinking.

And then this morning, he got the paycheck, and then he just went off. And I hadn't finished my math homework, and he also got mad about that; but I was working on ELA. So -- and that's the point where I went into his drawer

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1	and loaded his gun and
2	FEMALE OFFICER: You knew his gun was there?
3	A Yeah. I don't think he knew. But
4	FEMALE OFFICER: Had you ever used his gun before?
5	A Yeah. I have shot every gun in the house, like, with
6	my parents. Yeah.
7	MALE OFFICER: What kind of gun did you get today?
8	A I think it's a 40. But thank God I put the wrong
9	ammo in it.
10	MALE OFFICER: Where did he keep that in the house?
11	A Right, beside his bed, like in a drawer. Like it
12	was
13	Q Kind of like a nightstand type thing?
14	A Yeah. And he kept his alarm clock above it and the
15	ammo under it. Everything was covered by a piece of
16	paper. So how was he supposed to know that I knew where
17	it was? So and then once I got to the school, I shot
18	one round at a teacher. And then it jammed. And then I
19	shot again. And It jammed again every time. And I thank
20	God for that. Please say no one died. Did anyone die?
21	FEMALE OFFICER: At this point
22	(Interruption.)
23	FEMALE OFFICER: So, going back to how many guns
24	were in the house? A lot of guns?
25	A That's impossible. But every single one was in his
	line of the start

safe, except one, which is a black powder rifle. That's the black powder rifle.

Q Right.

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A And then if there was a shotgun laying around the house, it was never loaded. No ammo ever anywhere.
 Q I don't want to interrupt you, but a minute ago you said you put the wrong ammo in the gun?
 A I put cheap ammo in the gun, which is good. Which is

A I put cheap ammo in the gun, which is good. Which is good. And then once I finally figured out I'm going to hell for this, I threw the gun away and I just took my vest off, threw my hat down, called my Papa and Nanna and just told them what happened. And they said they were going to come down, pick me up, and take me to the sheriff's office.

And I was like, "Papa, you can't do that. I'm going to get arrested." And that's basically when the fireman came around the corner, told me to get on the ground, blah, blah, blah.

FEMALE OFFICER: What happened -- so this morning you went and got the gun, and you said you got cheap ammo. Was that your ammo?

A No. That was his. At least I think it was cheap ammo. I like guns and stuff, but I don't know a lot about ammo so.

Q And where was he at that point when you got the gun?

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1	A He was reading his bill in his chair.
2	Q And then what happened?
3	A I went in there and shot him three times. Then I
4	immediately ran downstairs, gave my rabbit a kiss, went
5	back up, gave all the dogs kisses. And then went in his
6	truck and drove to the school.
7	Q And
8	FEMALE OFFICER: And then what happened? You drove
9	it to the school?
10	A Yeah, I drove behind the school and then jumped out
11	and started shooting. Then it jammed.
12	FEMALE OFFICER: So it jammed.
13	A Then I just got mad at myself and started yelling,
14	screaming to the top of my lungs, just saying, "Why did I
15	do this?" So
16	FEMALE OFFICER: Did you had you gone to that
17	school?
18	A I went to school. That was the first school I ever
19	went to. And nobody liked me there. So
20	• FEMALE OFFICER: Is that what you felt like? You
21	felt like
22	A Nobody ever likes me.
23	Q Why you say that? You seem like a nice kid.
24	A Exactly.
25	Q You do, I mean

3	FEMALE OFFICER: Well, you know what? Growing up is
4	hard.

7	the vest?

10	A Yeah, it was just a vest that I could put ammo in and
11	my phone if I needed to call my papa. Because I was
12	freaking out.
13	Q Sounds like you're pretty close to your papa?
14	A Yeah, I hope I can let him visit me, and my mom and
15	my Nanna. So
16	FEMALE OFFICER: Did you ever talk to anybody else
17	today about what was going on before you did it?
18	A Yes. I was wanting to tell this to you-all. But
19	every time someone comes by the door, they just come back.
20	Q Like I said, we're here to listen to whatever you
21	want to say.
22	A There's this one group that's on my Instagram. It's
23	private and there's this group of random people and they,
24	like, told me they were my friends and stuff. And they
25	said they were all going to shoot up their schools too.

And I was like, Okay, actually people get me. But at
the same time I don't want to. So
FEMALE OFFICER: So were you saying, were you
talking about doing this earlier on the evening?
A Yeah, but it was still, like, my mom and dad were
fussing a lot so I was
Q You were just spouting off on the
A Yeah. I finally found people to actually talk to me.
Q You said there was an Instagram.
A Yeah. And one of them was from Manhattan. The rest
are from Germany and England. So
Q Do you recall what the name of the group is?
A No. But they probably changed it.
Q What's your Instagram name? Do you remember? Is it
on your phone or on you computer?
A It's on my phone. I think it's private. It might
not be. I don't know.
FEMALE OFFICER: Is there a password?
A To my phone?
Q Yeah.
A Yes.
Q What's your password?
A It's like one of them linear
Q So you got to draw it out?
A Yeah. You want me to draw it out?

9	FEMALE OFFICER: Did anyone know that you were going
10	to go to the school today?
11	A The kids in my group. Yeah.
12	FEMALE OFFICER: Did you tell them this morning?
13	A Yeah. And they were cheering me on, so what else was
14	I supposed to do? They're just a bunch of lunatics.
15	FEMALE OFFICER: Yeah, sometimes. That's
16	unfortunate. Unfortunately, those type of people are
17	drawn to the internet.
18	A And you will see a bunch of Columbine and stuff like
19	that on my page and stuff. I felt like this year, it's
20	like I had
21	FEMALE OFFICER: Because you've been bullied?
22	A Yeah. Basically, just started stuff.
23	Q Well, let's get back to earlier today. You're at the
24	house, your dad is kind of I guess he's upset?
25	A He was upset that

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1	٩	Seems to be tight at the house?
2	A	He was upset that he got big chickens but he got paid
3] like	below poverty line. And we needed money anyway.
4	Q	Is that what you-all do for a living, raise chickens?
5	A	Yeah. My mom is a dental hygienist. I don't know

8	all the animals hugs, and then put my vest on. I put some
9	ammo in my vest so I could just grab it. And then I put
10	my hat on and ran upstairs and drove there.
11	FEMALE OFFICER: Had you already said on the
12	Instagram exactly the location of the school?
13	A No. Never.
14	FEMALE OFFICER: You just said you were going to
15	shoot up the school?
16	A Yeah. Sadly.
17	FEMALE OFFICER: Had you considered doing this
18	before today?
19	A Yes, but not as much as today. Because I always have
20	this anger feeling whenever someone doesn't, like, treat
21	my friend well or something like that. I just can't
22	control sometimes, and I can't stop moving either. So,
23	I don't know what's wrong with that.
24	
25	inder it always been lownville Elementary always
	been your school that you were going to?
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1	A No. I started in 4-K, and then I went up to fifth
2	grade. And then everybody started bullying me. I don't
3	even remember why. Then they changed me to West Oak. I
4	went there for about a year and a half, then got arrested

12	A Honestly, I don't know. But it's just like Virginia		
13	Tech, a guy went in with two handguns and killed 32		
14	people. So		
15	Q Somewhere in there you have to stop and reload.		
16	A Yeah.		
17	Q Did you have any extra magazines with you?		
18	A My dad never, ever bought extra magazines, except for		
19	a semiautomatic rifle.		
20	Q You said you really wanted to use		
21	A That, yeah.		
22	Q What kind of gun is that?		
23	A To the media it's called an assault rifle. But it's		
24	just a hunting rifle. It's also known as a ranger rifle.

2	Q But you couldn't get that, you said?

7	A I was pretending I was texting. But I think he knew	
8	so he changed it. Because I tried I even put dish soap	
9	on the thing and turned the lights off.	
10	FEMALE OFFICER: When were you doing that? How far	
11	back?	
12	A A long time ago. It was a long time ago, like a	
13	month.	
14	Q I'm going to play my ignorance. You said you put	
15	dish soap?	
16	A Dish Soap. It glows neon in the dark and shows up	
17	fingerprints, so it would show up the code. I just tried	
18	different numbers.	
19	Q You have that video on your phone?	
20	A I don't anymore. No. I think I deleted it because I	
21	was, like, "Okay, I don't need to have this on my phone."	
22	I think if my dad would have found it, he would have	
23	been like, "Okay, you're grounded."	
24	FEMALE OFFICER: So you were kind of planning this	
25	all along?	

A Just for like a month or two. I finally had enough of people bullying me. I was, like, if I want to kill myself, I'm not going out without a fight. But that's kind of ironic now that I think of it. I guess in the heat of the moment, I guess that was the right thing to do, I thought.

FEMALE OFFICER: If you hadn't done it today, when do you think you would have done it?

A I think I would have waited, because I was saving up my money because anybody in my family -- I have the money for it, they can buy it for me. So I was going to by me an AR15. But I knew it was going to be stuck in the safe, so I was going to have to find a way to get it out. But he never gave me the job for some reason. That's probably a good thing too. But that's probably a bad thing also. I don't know.

FEMALE OFFICER: Well, thank you for being honest with us.

A I'm just glad to talk to someone. Just staying in there just --

FEMALE OFFICER: It's hard to sit and just think about things.

A Yeah, because all I keep remembering is going up behind my dad and just shooting him three times. That's all my mind is going through right now.

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Did your dad say anything? Q 1 He was reading something. No. А 2 So he never knew you were behind him? Q 3 No, I just seen him slump over. I thought I missed А 4 the first time, so I shot him two more. Then I seen him 5 slump over, and I was like, "What have I just did? Ι 6 can't go back now." So --7 It's already done. But I'm pretty sure he's dead. 8 I'm hoping he's not, but I'm pretty sure he is. 9 Well, what was your ultimate goal? I mean, what --10 Q you know, if you know you shot your dad and you knew you 11 went over to the school and some kids got hurt there, what 12 were you looking -- I mean, were you planning to take your 13 own life? 14 Because I was just done.
