9. FINANCIAL PROPOSAL

Cost, Revenue, and Charge Review

Cost Proposal

Shoals Ambulance recognizes that EMS systems have both operational and financial impacts on the communities we serve. In this proposal, we have presented Blount County with a comprehensive and customized deployment plan designed to enhance the availability of ACLS Paramedic coverage, align with tiered response models, increase operational efficiency, and improve patient outcomes. Our plan also includes direct oversight of field teams by an ACLS Paramedic Supervisor to ensure the highest standards of care are consistently maintained.

The two following cost proposal options have been carefully developed to balance both operational effectiveness and financial responsibility.

Option 1

- Four (4) ACLS Paramedic Ambulances
- One (1) ALS EMT-A IFT Ambulance
- One (1) ACLS Paramedic Supervisor QRV
- All ambulances are 24-hour units
- \$1,500,000 per year subsidy paid by Blount County

Option 2

- Four (4) ACLS Paramedic Ambulances
- One (1) ALS EMT-A IFT Ambulance
- One (1) ACLS Paramedic Supervisor QRV
- All ambulances are 24-hour units
- \$1,250,000 per year subsidy paid by Blount County
- \$250,000 per year subsidy paid by UAB St. Vincent's Blount

Accepted Insurance

Shoals Ambulance is currently in-network with BCBS. Upon contract award, we will pursue innetwork contracts with all payers common to Blount County.

Private Pay

Shoals Ambulance's billing office will serve as the first point of contact for all uninsured patient accounts. We will initiate standard billing procedures and undertake diligent collection efforts in accordance with industry best practices. This includes patient outreach and payment plan options when applicable.

In cases where the patient is uninsured, Shoals Ambulance's billing team will follow our parent company, Priority OnDemand's financial assistance policy as follows:

Subsidy Amount

Regional Paramedical Services proposes that we will staff the county and the units based on the county's needs. To meet the response time standards and with our proposed changes, RPS requests a subsidy payment of \$125,000 monthly. This will total \$1.5 million after 12 months. As Profit and Losses are determined, RPS will be open for negotiations. A complete billing cycle is no less than 6 months, after this time, collection for tickets will be averaged and discussions can begin. This is based on the Response times we think we can offer and a tiered response system.

This does not included any dedicated units for the hospital. This is however taking into consideration the call volume from the hospital. Should the hospital contract out it's calls, that would negatively impact our operations and would cause an increase in the proposed subsidy. Should the hospital contract with us, it could potentially lower the subsidy amount but that could only be determined likely after the first year. It would not result in a large decrease as the hospital transports are only a small part of the entire call volume.

Based on our research we find call volume to be between 16-18 transports a day. The numbers provided in the RFP show 21. We are willing to renegotiate after a year of financials can be reviewed. We will be willing to share P/L statements.
