QECEPOLICY1. New Hampshire is one of the few states that has no funding allocated for preschool programs, not even for low income children. That means over 19 thousand low-income kids who could benefit most from high-quality early education have no access to pre-kindergarten. I want to expand funding so at least the lowest income 4 year olds who want to attend preschool have access in our state, and help ensure more kids have an equal opportunity to succeed.
