What truly sets Derek apart is his heart for mentorship. Through The Infamous Unstoppables, a youth drill team and drumline he coaches and leads, Derek offers young people not just a creative outlet, but a second family. His program teaches discipline, teamwork, cultural pride, and self-respect. He's a coach, a mentor, and often a stand-in father figure to kids who need guidance, structure, and love. Derek spends dozens of volunteer hours each month — often nights and weekends — planning practices, transporting youth, coordinating performances, and fundraising to keep the program running. Many of the youth he works with have overcome adversity, and Derek is there every step of the way, pushing them to be their best and reminding them that they are seen, heard, and valued. The impact of his work is immeasurable. His mentorship has kept kids off the streets, in school, and focused on something bigger than themselves. His advocacy through AACAL has brought awareness, visibility, and cultural healing to Lancaster. And perhaps most importantly, his presence has inspired a new generation to take pride in who they are and to give back to their community. Derek doesn't do any of this for recognition. He does it because it's who he is — a servant leader, a strong voice in the community, and a role model who believes that when you pour into others, your community rises with you.
